Shortly after HSCAZ employee Michele, learned about our Humanitarian Hold program a call came to the shelter requesting a Humanitarian Hold for a

Instead of a day, Heidi would need to be in the hospital for two months. The costs for kenneling Ginger were beyond her means as she was on a fixed income and her worries about the well-being of Ginger in a long-term kennel environment were creating tremendous stress for her.

HSCAZ was over capacity and the staff was searching for a place for Ginger to be cared for while Heidi healed but there was no apparent answer. Without much thought, Michele piped up, "My family will take her."

Michele had always wanted a dog but felt inadequate to care for one, even though she was raising two daughters on her own. Michele says, "When I met Ginger at the kennel I immediately noticed her beauty but she looked very frightened and confused. She clearly missed her "mom" and must have wondered what had happened to her. I was certain that she needed to be removed from the kennel and when I took her to my car she hopped right into the back and we were on our way."

As the weeks passed Michele and her daughters began to fall in love with

Ginger. "She was such a delight...funny, loving, and a wonderful addition to our household," says Michele. "She didn't bark, just made a quiet growl that ended up in a soft "Woof." She loved going on the trails behind our house. She loved baths. She didn't beg at the table. At all times she was a perfect lady!"

Michele's family began to sadly think of the day when Ginger would leave them, knowing that although it would be a very sad time for them, it would be a wonderful moment for Heidi and Ginger. Then, on a cold snowy day they received a phone call from a friend of Heidi. Heidi had died and her surviving family members could not take Ginger. Her friend asked Michele if she would like to adopt Ginger. "Although we were very sad to hear the news of Heidi passing we quickly said yes to adopting Ginger," said Michele. "Our house is now a home with Ginger in it. I am grateful to have Ginger in my life and I believe that Heidi would be at peace knowing that she is in a home where she is cared for and adored."

Many caring people throughout Rim Country collect and donate aluminum cans to HSCAZ as a way for us to earn money to benefit the animals we serve. Once the cans are received several super volunteers remove the cans from our bins, sort the cans and prepare them for crushing. Ted took on the task of crushing the cans with the help of one other incredible volunteer. He also manages delivery of the crushed cans to the recycling company. The Aluminum Can Program brings in an estimated \$15,000.00 each year! The program is organized 100% by volunteers. Ted will be retiring from the

Aluminum Can Processor task this Spring. As appreciation an original trophy was crafted out of aluminum cans and presented to Ted from staff and other volunteers. We thank you Ted for your years of volunteer service to help the animals who share our journey.

VOLUNTEER ORIENTATION

Volunteer Training and Orientation sessions are held monthly in order to allow those with interest in volunteering a means of learning more about HSCAZ, the animals we serve, areas of need and what it means to be an HSCAZ volunteer. We are grateful that interest in helping animals is high and we typically average twenty new people who attend each orientation. The monthly orientations run approximately 90 minutes to ensure ample time for presentations, facility tour and question/answer sessions with new volunteers. FACILITIES UPDATE

We are excited to announce that after several false starts plans for a new shelter are complete and the process of selecting a general contractor is underway. The construction contract for the new facilities will be awarded later this month with construction anticipated to begin in mid to late May as we continue to make progress in our efforts towards a new animal shelter!

Plans call for approximately 7000 square feet of enclosed space

including administrative offices, food preparation and laundry facilities as well as animal intake, isolation and treatment rooms. The new design though significantly smaller than the original, will nonetheless be fully functional and affordable. The facility is designed with future expansion in mind as the community needs grow and funding becomes available.

The new shelter will be built adjacent to the current facility at 812 S. McLane with funds in hand to meet construction costs without need of financing. When construction is complete, the existing facility will be demolished to make way for a permanent access

road.

We continue to receive tremendous support from donors throughout the community, the region and the state who understand the overwhelming need for a facility in central Arizona which will be animal-friendly and will provide an appropriate environment which embodies all the elements necessary to safely and compassionately shelter and care for the animals who come our way. We are deeply grateful for all of the kindness, generosity, patience and perseverance of the community at large on this long, winding and ultimately successful journey!

Granite's "angel" arrived next morning equipped with a plush, comfy dog bed and a seatbelt harness for the 7 hour car ride. With tears of joy in our eyes we kissed him goodbye, confident that he would never feel hurt, scared or alone again. Along with a new wonderful life, Granite has a new wonderful name, Buzz. He is loved very much and his adopter is so pleased with him, he assured us he'd be back again for another companion.
