BENEFIT FOR THE BEST OF THE BEST



A sold out crowd of animal lovers enjoyed an afternoon in the pines at the "Country Wine, Jazz, Cheese and Chocolate Festival" a fund-raiser to benefit the animals served by

HSCAZ. The benefit was hosted by the Rusty Lyon family at beautiful La Cienega Ranch.

Lyon son, Mark Lyon, winemaker for Sebastiani Vineyards in Sonoma, Calif., furnished the wines and was on hand to pour the wines and discuss the winemaking process.

Funds were raised through ticket sales and a raffle for a trip to a Sonoma resort and spa along with other special items. HSCAZ supporters Cathy and Chuck Buckisch won the raffle and are planning their trip to Sonoma wine country in the fall.

A \$40,000 challenge gift was announced from a Valley donor who asked that festival attendees and the community at large step up to make a new shelter a reality.

That challenge generated and additional \$55,000 in pledges from the generosity of attendees who stepped forward at the event or sent generous gifts as a response to the challenge, bringing the funds raised from the event to more than \$114,000.

The money raised will be directed toward completing critically needed new facilities which are necessary to carry on the Humane Society mission to rescue, shelter, and seek appropriate and loving homes for the animals served by HSCAZ.

SHELTER FROM THE STORMS

The number of abandoned and homeless animals has continued to rise and there are times when we must turn animals away due to overcrowding and lack of space. Our mission and intention is to support and help as many animals as possible and the means we use must be creative at times, especially in our current circumstances. When we are bursting at the seams with cats, kittens, dogs and puppies and have no additional space options we contact shelters with whom we are familiar and if space is available we transfer



animals to their care. Likewise, we sometimes accept animals from organizations who find themselves in similar circumstances. We are very grateful for the collaborative effort and compassionate intentions of the rescue organizations with whom we work. After all is said and done, it is always about the animals and what we can do for them.

Although our facilities are primitive and decrepit we take great pride in our ability and efforts to compassionately provide shelter and loving care for the lost, abandoned or homeless animals who we are able to accept. We are inspired by the unconditional love we receive from the animals in our care and are amazed at their grace and ability to live life as it is.

Facilities Update During the past twelve months we have been successful in raising an additional \$175k towards construction of new facilities thanks to the incredible

generosity of those who love animals and who support HSCAZ. Although that is a very significant amount, the total funds available in the building fund are approximately \$500k, far from the \$3mm necessary to complete the planned shelter which had been designed to incorporate projected space needs, equipment and furnishings for decades to come.

When the plans were created

intentions and expectations were high that the funds for the \$4mm shelter would be forthcoming from individuals, foundations and corporations dedicated to animal welfare. Prior to the downturn in the economy significant funds were raised and were used for preconstruction requirements including architectural drawings, engineering, site preparation and groundbreaking. However, the unprecedented economic circumstances have made the task of raising the necessary funds for the "dream" shelter, a very slow and difficult process.

Unfortunately, the animals cannot wait and we must have new facilities now. The current facilities are terribly lacking in space, are literally crumbling and will not withstand more floods, windstorms or freezing blizzards. In order to move the project forward with the funds at hand and some additional funding sources, the board of directors established an ad hoc committee of community leaders to investigate all means available to make it possible for a phased and simplified build out. After much consideration and review the board and staff committed to having new downsized facilities for the animals built and occupied within the next twelve months with a complete build out of the HSCAZ campus as funds become available over the next several years.

The planned facilities and programs will make our communities more humane places for all. Compassion, kindness, generosity of spirit and resources will make a new shelter a reality. It will happen "because they matter" to so many among us.

Special Needs Animals



Hundreds of animals come through our doors each year. They are homeless for a number of

reasons ranging from a change in their owner's life, abandonment or simply being lost. Some are reclaimed but sadly, many are not. And some are injured or have a condition that requires veterinary treatment but due to costs they may be considered unadoptable.

Little Cherry a beautiful, 3 month old purebred Shar-pei, was brought to us as a stray. She had a condition common to her breed known as "Cherry Eye" which is turning in or prolapse of the third eye lid. Animals with medical conditions are often considered a "toss out" by their owner, which may be why Cherry was picked up as a stray and brought to our door.

Through our "Second Chance" program funded by grants, special individual donors and the Payson *Paws in the Park* organization, animals such as Cherry are given the medical care that is needed to provide them with a second chance at life. *Paws in the Park* raises money for the program and donates it to HSCAZ.

Cherry had successful surgery and shortly thereafter was adopted by a couple from the Phoenix area who are Shar-pei lovers. They found her on our website, fell in love with her and made her a member of their family. We are so deeply grateful to the members of *Paws in the Park* for their dedication to providing much needed funds for care and rehabilitation of special needs animals.
