## **MICROCHIPS**

Microchipping your animal is an important process to help get a lost animal back home to it's owner. HSCAZ offers microchipping to the public Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday from 10:00am to 3:00pm, as long as there is medical staff available, for only \$25.00 per animal. Appointments are requested, but not necessary.

After microchipping, there is no further work for you to do. HSCAZ will register the microchip for you.

The process takes approximately 5 - 10 minutes and the majority of that time is filling out the necessary paperwork. So don't delay, make your appointment today.

Ever wonder what you could do when you have a few hours to spare? Come volunteer for the Humane Society of Central Arizona. We are always accepting volunteer applications and there are several areas you could lend a hand (and your time) in.

Resale Store: You can volunteer in receiving where you can sort through donations, price items, and take donations out to the sales floor or up front at the cash register. Any volunteers that would like to help at our Resale Store will be contacted by the store manager, Ryan.

**Shelter:** Cat socialization, housekeeping (laundry/dishes), cat house cleaning, and/or dog walking.

HSCAZ has re-vamped the Volunteer Program at the shelter so all volunteers that want to share their time with the animals will need to attend a New Volunteer Orientation and a Hands-On Training (if working with dogs) which we try to hold monthly. ## **DECLAWING CATS**

Declawing cats may seem like a good idea at first, but it really is something that should *never* be considered.

Declawing is actually multiple amputations comparable to the removal of human fingertips at the first knuckle. Sensory and motor nerves are cut, damaged and destroyed. Recovery from the surgery is a slow and painful process. This procedure can hamper the sensations and enjoyment involved in walking, running, springing, climbing and stretching. Removing claws changes the way a cat's foot meets the ground and can cause lasting paw pain, back pain, infection, tissue necrosis (tissue death) and lameness.

Declawing a cat may also result in behavior issues as well. Urinating/defecating outside of their litterbox is probably the most common complaint. Paw sensitivity resulting from the declaw operation may result in litterbox avoidance and urine-soaked furnishings or carpeting. Many declawed cats also resort to nipping or biting with very little warning.

Alternatives to declawing cats: There are several alternatives to declawing cats, although effectiveness may vary depending on a cat's age and temperament. Some of the more prevalent alternatives to declawing cats are:

- Behavioral Training: This is a much more effective alternative for kittens than adult cats, and involves redirecting a misbehaving cat to a toy or scratching post.
- **Sticky Paws:** These are is sort of like huge, double sided Scotch tape, but the glue is designed to be safe for the furniture. It makes the surface unpleasant for the cat's feet to touch, and they quickly learn to stay away.
- Soft Claws: These are vinyl nail caps for cat claws that are applied with surgical adhesive, and to which cats usually get used to within a few days.
- Frequent Nail Trimming: This is a less effective, but nonetheless widely used alternative to declawing cats. It involves trimming the nails very short. However, this method will not stop a cat from sharpening its existing claws and using them.
- **Toys/Scratching Post:** This might be a foregone conclusion in the eyes of some cat owners, but it is very important to have sufficient options for feline recreation and respite. Some cats are very particular, so make sure the equipment you invest in has your feline friend's seal of approval.
- **Appropriate environmental enrichment:** Cats are natural hunters and explorers. When we make them indoor pets, they can experience stress if not provided with an enriched environment full of outlets for their inquisitive, playful energy. An enriched environment includes providing things like scratching surfaces, toys, cat trees and more.

The month of April usually marks the beginning of the official kitten season. Because of our climate, kitten season can last until October and HSCAZ often gets flooded with cats and, especially, kittens.

A common question HSCAZ gets...I found a litter of kittens, what do I do?

If you happen to come across stray kittens, please leave them where they are. Our natural instinct of wanting to help and protect the kittens comes out, but most times intervention isn't required.

The best advise is to leave the kitten alone. Most often, mom is out finding food for herself and will return shortly. The kittens need to remain with mom for the best chance of survival so give her a chance to return to her babies.

If you are certain the kittens have been orphaned (mom hasn't come back for about 8 hours), you may step in and help care for the kittens until they are approximately 8 weeks old. At that time, you can bring them into the shelter.

If mom has continued to raise her babies and they are now weaned from mom, you can bring them into the shelter.

Donations are now needed for kitten season: wet food, KMR milk replacement, bottles, nipples, small blankets, etc.

## PETS AND WARMING TEMPERATURES

Is it too hot to walk my dog? Test it...hold your bare food on the ground for about 7 seconds. If it's too hot for your bare feet, then it's too hot for your pup.

**Never, ever leave your pet in your car.** The inside temperature of a vehicle can sky rocket in a very short amount of time. If you're going to be out shopping, please leave your pets at home.

#### Summer safety tips:

- Keep your pet indoors when possible
- Limit outdoor exercise to early morning or evening
- Avoid long walks, hikes, and excessive play
- Consider dog booties for hot pavement

## **2ND CHANCE FUND**

Every animal deserves a second chance after being left to fend for themselves. Verde was found on the side of HWY 87/260 by chance, standing off to the side hiding between dead brush and a hill. She was emaciated and had several injuries throughout her body. Ready to accept the care she so desperately needed, she allowed her finder to scoop her up and be driven to HSCAZ. Weighing in under 39 pounds she began her journey through gaining weight with consistent feedings, medications to fight off the abscesses and open wounds causing her pain and a comfy bed to call her own at night. Fast forward 3-4 months, Verde has gained enough weight that you can no longer see her defined spine, protruding ribcage and hip bones. All of her injuries have finally healed just leaving behind the remnants of scarring. Her eyes are full of joy being surrounded with a medical team, staff and volunteers to care for her needs and let her know she doesn't have to struggle to survive every day.



**FIRE SEASON PREP** 

This year's wet Winter has, unfortunately, made way for a dangerous Summer. It's always better to be prepared for a possible evacuation than to get the "Go" order and have nothing ready. Here are a few tips to make any disaster a bit easier on you and your fur-baby.

#### Prepare a "Go Bag" that includes;

- Your pet's vet records
- A recent photo
- A week's supply of food and water
- A crate, leash, collar and/or harness
- Medications

### Before a disaster occurs;

- Verify your pet's microchip
- Create a short list of pet friendly hotels, friends, and family that you can go to during an evacuation.
- Make sure your pet is wearing some kind of ID (tags, writing your info on their collar, order a custom collar with yours/his information, etc.).

# What you need to know to get started.

- Teal Recyclops bags are for plastic, cans, small cardboard & paper. (No need to sort these recyclables.)
- Yellow Recyclops bags are for glass. (please remove all corks or lids)
- Please wait until your glass bags are full to place them out on your curb.
- Large cardboard does not need to be bagged. Please flatten and place under your bags.
- We will be unable to pick up recycling that isn't bagged (other than large flattened cardboard). \*Using these bags helps keep recycling clean and helps protect Recyclops drivers from injury.

- Cardboard & pasteboard

- Newspapers
